HOW COME THE GARDEN STILL LOOKS SO GOOD?



After four months of no significant rain, Gravitas head Jan Melkenbeek freely admits "it's been a tough Summer to keep everything going". But somehow he & his ever-energetic team have managed it, with the aid of the irrigation system in the flower beds & also manual watering of the trees. The tree rings at the base of each one have been increased so they get more water & oxygen.

There have been benefits from the hot sunny weather as well – the tree fern has been doing exceptionally well, with fronds two metres long which Jan says is quite unusual. And there's a magnificent display of red cana & pink & white begonias towards the Warrington/Castellain Road corner of the garden, an area which has previously lacked colour as being some distance away from the main beds.





After heavy pruning the olive tree in the Med bed has come back to life & could be bearing fruit in a couple of years. And the hostas currently rather tucked away by the Formosa St gate are soon to be transplanted there away from the depredations of the slugs.

Last but not least, we finally have two smart new benches made of teak, one in the Med Bed & the other in front of the bed on the Warrington Crescent side.

A message from the Board

Having the opportunity to allow dogs off-lead unlike other gardens has always been part of our unique culture and despite notable progress over the first half of the year thanks to the majority of owners a couple of outliers persist in leaving dog mess, ignoring the dog hours or allowing dogs to bark persistently.

IT'S A WINNING FORMULA...



....so why would we think to change it?? For the third year running the multi-award-winning Firework Crazy will be in charge of our firework display on November 8th, the nearest Saturday to Bonfire Night. When the Board made the switch of supplier in 2023 the company's first outing was held by residents to be the best ever in the event's 25-year history, & yet miraculously last year's was seen somehow to improve on it! We're confident Director Mark Priest can pull off the same trick this year.

The display will start as usual at 7 pm (allowing residents to also catch the fireworks in neighbouring Crescent Garden at 7.30 pm as many like to do) but the bonfire will be lit a little earlier this year, at 5.30 pm, so it will be blazing nicely for any early arrivals. The entry point will again be the Castellain Road gate which will close 10 minutes before the show begins – late-comers will emphatically *not* be admitted! The spectator area will comprise the full Garden perimeter, plus the triangular corners at the Formosa Street & Sutherland Ave/Warrington Crescent ends.

A Health & Safety person will be located near the gardeners' gate in the corner of Castellain & Warrington & will be available from 5.30 pm to 8.30 pm, subject to rain. If it does rain a different location will be confirmed closer to the date.

The usual caveats apply about keeping windows closed & nervous pets indoors. Please also ensure that children are supervised at all times & that no personal fireworks or sparklers are brought into the Garden.

The event is kindly being sponsored by Winkworth's, one of London's oldest estate agents which first opened its doors in 1835. It now has 90 branches nationwide, including four in North-West London of which the one in Sutherland Avenue (taken over from Vickers) is the latest addition. All four are overseen by Managing Director Neil Sloam, who says: "Estate agents tend to have a reputation for taking rather than giving & we wanted to redress the balance. We actually do care about the communities we serve."

TUBE CLEAN-UP: STILL A WORK IN PROGRESS!



Transport for London have been working hard to remove the graffiti that have been heavily defacing Bakerloo line trains since at least the beginning of this year, & inside the carriages the situation has undoubtedly improved.
